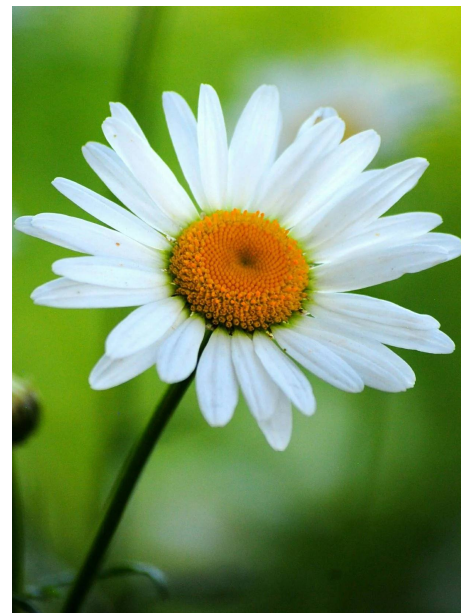


Welcome to Fall 2026 GROW!

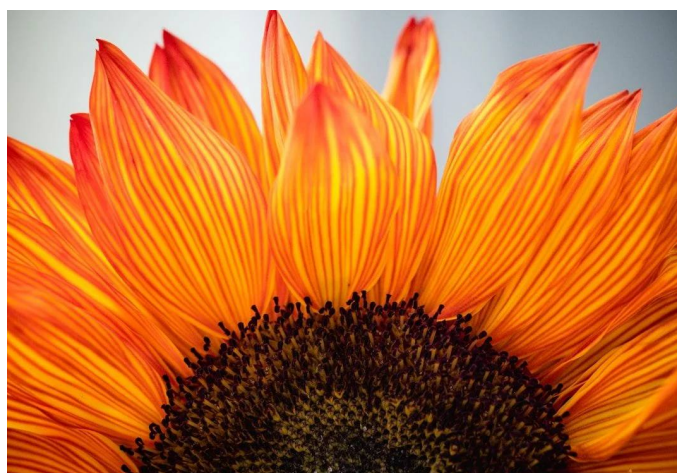

October is Women's History Month and Islamic History Month!



October is Women's History Month in Canada, a time to recognize and celebrate the important contributions of women and girls, past and present. It is also Islamic History Month, offering an opportunity to learn about and celebrate the rich contributions of Muslim communities.

Throughout history, women have helped shape our communities in countless ways as leaders, caregivers, creators and changemakers. Islamic history includes many contributions to science, medicine, math, art and architecture, with inspiring women playing important roles in these achievements.

For example, Fatima al-Fihri founded the world's first degree-granting university, creating a place of learning for all that still exists to this day in Morocco. Ibtihaj Muhammad, an Olympic athlete, was the first hijab-wearing woman to compete at the Olympics. She promotes inclusion and representation in sports, and is the author of several children's books that explore themes of kindness, courage and belonging. Zaha Hadid, a world-renowned architect, is recognized for her bold and creative designs, and was the first woman to receive the prestigious Pritzker Architecture Prize in 2004.

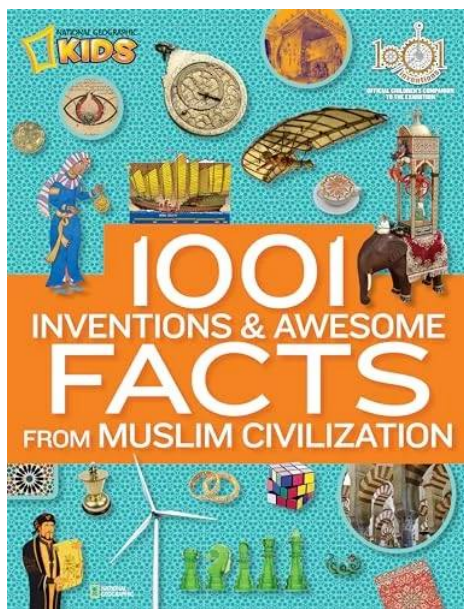
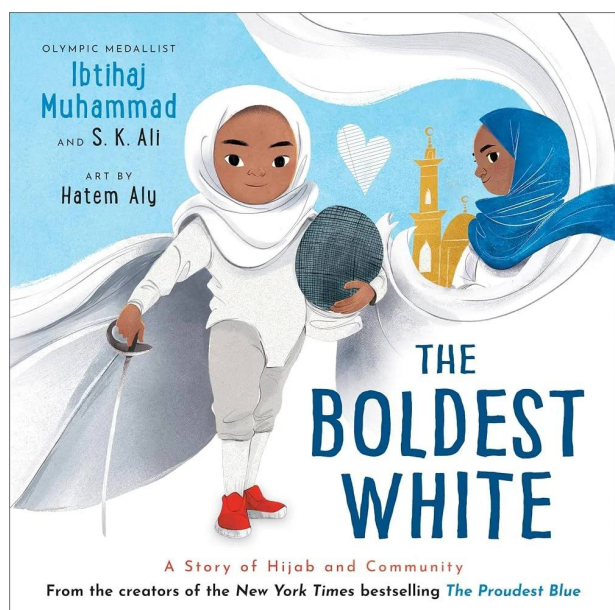

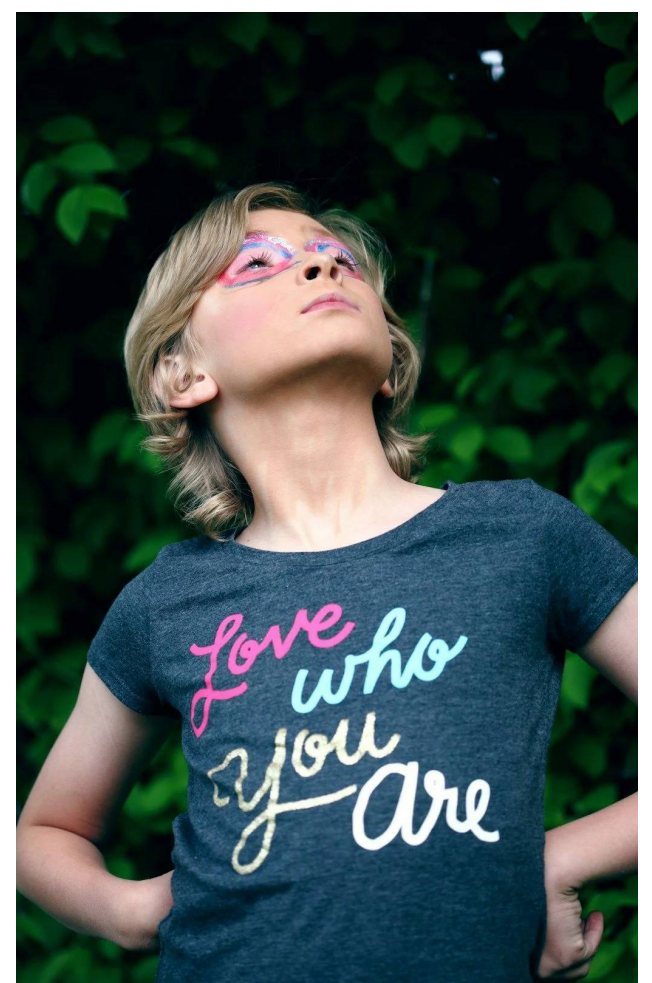

2SLGBTQIA+ Identity versus expression versus attraction

Gender identity and gender expression are closely related but distinct parts of who a person is. Gender identity refers to a person's internal sense of being male, female, both, neither or somewhere along the gender spectrum essentially, who they are. Gender expression is how a person presents their gender to the world through clothing, behaviour, voice or hairstyle—it is how they present. These are separate from attraction, which describes who someone is emotionally or romantically drawn to.

In early learning environments, understanding and respecting these differences is essential because young children are already forming a sense of self and belonging. When educators create spaces where diverse identities and expressions are affirmed through inclusive language, representation and supportive responses, children learn that they are seen, valued and safe to be themselves. This fosters not only individual well-being and confidence but also empathy and respect among peers. Not only can this practice be inclusive to the children in the program but also to the families and colleagues centre wide at the early learning centre. By recognizing that individuals may experience and express their identity differently, educators help build inclusive communities where every child and family feels they belong, setting a foundation for acceptance and equity that extends far beyond the classroom.





Strengthening our bonds - Indigenous early years learning

Autumn reflects: learning, connection and reconciliation

Autumn is a season of change, gratitude and preparation, as the land begins its transition toward rest. In many Indigenous ways of knowing, this is a time to honour the gifts of the earth, reflect on our relationships and give thanks for the abundance shared by all our relations. The changing colours, falling leaves and harvest season remind us that learning, growth and renewal are part of life's natural cycles.

September also brings important opportunities for reflection and learning. Orange Shirt Day and the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, observed on September 30, honour Residential School Survivors, remember the children who never returned home and acknowledge the ongoing impacts of colonial policies on Indigenous communities. These observances encourage all of us to continue learning about Indigenous histories and to take meaningful steps toward reconciliation through understanding, respect and action.

In early learning environments, educators can support children in developing a sense of belonging, empathy and respect by engaging with stories, seasonal teachings, nature-based experiences and age-appropriate conversations about community, identity and caring for one another. As we move into the fall season, we invite you to deepen your learning through the following professional learning opportunities.

Stories that connect us

Storytelling has long been a way of sharing knowledge, values, history and relationships. This fall, we are pleased to launch our new Indigenous Story Bag Collection, created to support educators in exploring Indigenous perspectives through high-quality children's literature and extensions. Each Story Bag offers opportunities for meaningful conversations, hands-on learning and connections to the land, community and one another. We look forward to sharing these resources and the learning journeys they inspire.

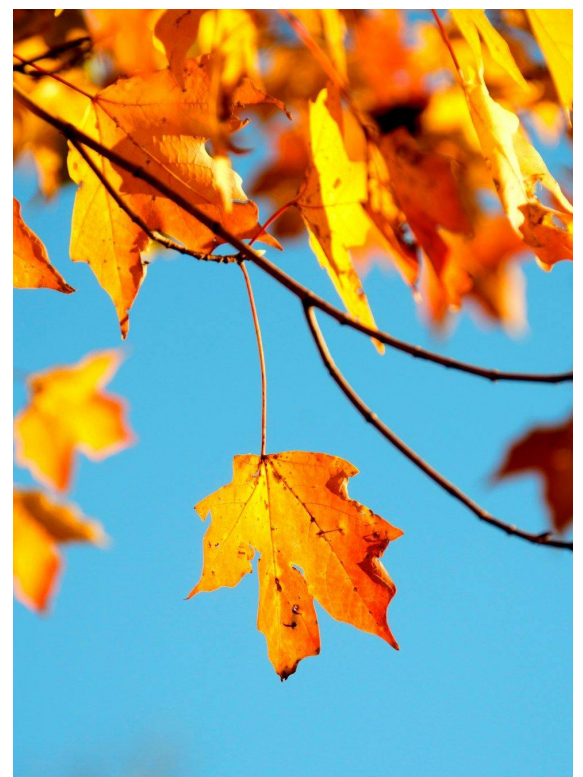
Outdoor explore and discover

EarlyON programs in Durham Region provide opportunities for children who are newborn to six years of age to participate in play and inquiry-based programs to support parents/caregivers in their roles.

QA Corner

Invitations to play

Invitations to play are intentionally planned activities and materials that encourage children to explore, create and learn through play. When educators set up invitations to play before children arrive, it helps children transition into the program more easily and become engaged right away. For example, educators may place loose parts at a building table, set up a drawing station with different art materials, create a sensory bin to explore or arrange pretend play materials based on children's interests. Invitations to play are meaningful and intentional, and extend beyond putting materials out for children to use (placing a puzzle on a table). Consider the children's interests and skills when designing and/or creating your program space. Consider what message the set up of the materials and/or program space is conveying to the children. Does the invitation encourage the children to engage or are there barriers? Does it prompt excitement and exploration?

Reflecting on How Does Learning Happen?, this practice fosters the foundation of Engagement, highlighting the importance of learning through play, exploration and inquiry. Invitations to play encourage children to make choices, solve problems, ask questions and follow their own ideas. They also support the foundations of Belonging, Well-Being and Expression by creating welcoming spaces where children feel included, capable and valued.

Invitations to play also reflect the expectations of the Durham Region Operating Criteria (DROC). DROC recognizes the importance of responsive educators, rich learning environments, and play-based experiences that support children's individual interests and development. Quality expectations are fostered and embedded into programs when educators provide materials and experiences that children can explore independently. Educators are then able to observe, document, and extend learning based on children's interests and needs.

By providing open-ended invitations to play each day, especially during arrival times, educators support smooth transitions, encourage active participation, spark curiosity, and create meaningful learning experiences that help children grow and develop in a child-centred environment. How does your program invite children to play? What experiences are set up to spark children's curiosity as soon as they arrive in your program? How are learning experiences, materials and invitations to play made accessible throughout the day so children can engage in meaningful exploration beyond planned programming times? Your QAs always enjoy hearing about the many ways you incorporate quality standards into your daily practice and program experiences!

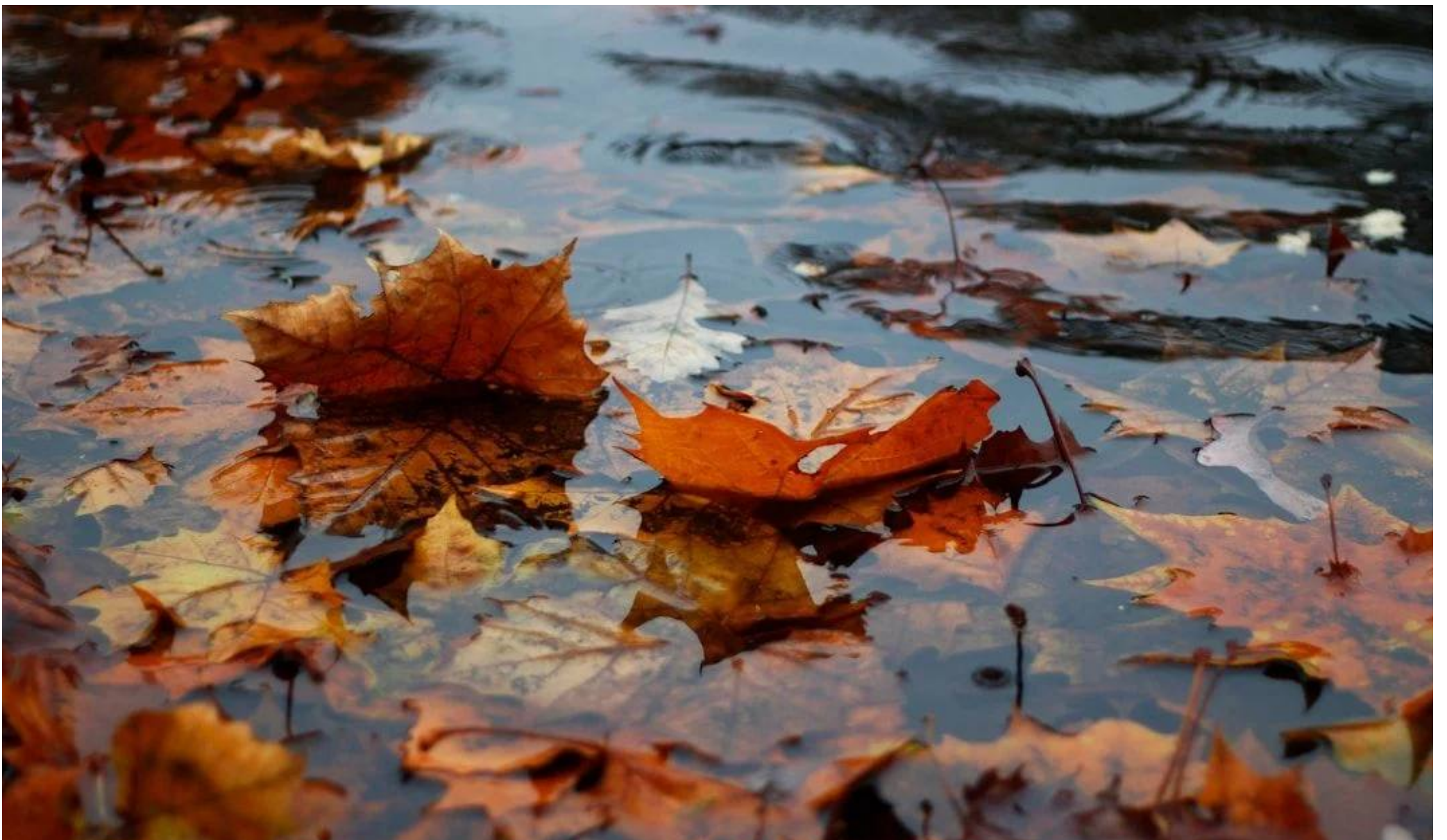

Highlight on Special Needs Resourcing in licensed Home Child Care

The Region of Durham offers services to help early learning and child care (ELCC) professionals offer inclusive programs that support children's physical, social-emotional and cognitive development. Licensed centre and home-based early learning and child care environments are legislated in the Child Care and Early Years Act, 2014, to create Individual Service Plans that reflect the special or individualized needs of children enrolled in ELCC sites.

The Region of Durham partners with four agencies to provide a holistic and complementary set of Special Needs Resourcing (SNR) services. These partners are funded through the Child Care and Early Years Division using provincial funding guidelines to provide SNR services.

The SNR agencies work with educators to build capacity within the system to support equity and inclusion of all children in licensed child care.

- Observation and reflective dialogue with home child care educators to share evidence-informed strategies, resources and suggestions that support individual children, group dynamics and meaningful participation.
- In-the-moment coaching and hands-on modelling to teach children new skills, support development and build home child care educators confidence in inclusive practices.
- Professional learning opportunities, including workshops and trainings tailored to the specific needs of each program, supporting ongoing growth in inclusive practice.
- Completion of an Inclusion Scale to identify program strengths and areas for growth in inclusive practice.
- As the first point of contact, support home child care educators in connecting with Special Needs Resourcing (SNR) partner agencies in Durham Region by initiating referrals and obtaining informed consent from families and guardians.
- Collaborate with SNR partners to support individual children and the program holistically.
- Support for home child care educators with child development screenings and monitoring of development.
- Support with the education and development of Individual Support Plans to support children who require more tailored approaches.
- Collaborate with Area Supervisors, Home Visitors and Home Consultants to discuss goals and strategies for the programs, as needed.
- Support for families through information sharing, service navigation and connections to community resources.

Early Childhood Education and leadership grant programs

Do you qualify for the Ontario Early Childhood Educator Qualification Upgrade Program?



Educators with six months of past or current experience working within a formal early learning program, licensed child care and unlicensed home child care environment may qualify for financial support for tuition, travel and associated costs to complete an Early Childhood Educator (ECE) diploma (full-time and part-time) at an approved Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nations, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required six months work experience if they have a minimum of one day of employment within an eligible agency.

Did you know Ontario offers employed RECE leadership education grants in eligible fields of study?

Currently employed RECEs with at least two years of experience may qualify for leadership education grants to cover part-time tuition costs in an eligible field of study at a recognized Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nation, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required two years of experience if currently employed with an eligible agency.

Eligible fields of study include:

- Pedagogical leadership in Early Childhood Education.
- Early Childhood Education administration and management.
- Facilities management.
- Financial management, responsibility and child care governance.
- Human resources, employment standards and labour relations.
