SUBJECT: 2026 Municipal Election – Sign Regulations and Key Information

As preparations continue for the 2026 Municipal Election, the City of Welland would like to provide residents, candidates, and registered third parties with a summary of the rules governing election signs within the municipality. These requirements are established under the City's Election Sign By-law and are intended to ensure public safety, maintain visibility for motorists and pedestrians, and provide a fair and consistent approach for all election participants.

When Can Election Signs Be Displayed?

For municipal elections, election signs may be erected beginning 45 days prior to Voting Day. As Voting Day is scheduled for October 26, 2026, election signs may be placed starting on September 11, 2026.

Candidates may display signs at a designated campaign office earlier, provided nomination requirements have been met and the campaign office has been identified to the Clerk as required by the by-law.

When Must Election Signs Be Removed?

All election signs must be removed no later than three (3) days following Voting Day. For the 2026 Municipal Election, all signs must therefore be removed by October 29, 2026.

Where Can Election Signs Be Placed?

Election signs are permitted on private property, provided the property owner's permission has been obtained and the sign complies with all applicable provisions of the by-law.

Residents should note that election signs:

- Require the consent of the property owner, lessees or tenant before being installed on private property.
- Must not interfere with driver sightlines or pedestrian safety.
- Must comply with size and placement requirements established in the by-law.
- Must include the name of the candidate or registered third party responsible for the sign.

Where Are Election Signs Prohibited?

Election signs are not permitted on City property. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Parks and recreational facilities
- City-owned buildings and lands
- Civic Square
- Libraries, arenas, fire halls, museums and transit facilities
- Boulevards and road allowances
- Medians and traffic islands
- Utility poles, light standards and traffic signal poles

Election signs are also prohibited at voting locations and in circumstances where they may create a safety concern for motorists or pedestrians.

Safety and Placement Requirements

To promote public safety, election signs:

- Must not be illuminated, except where permitted on approved billboards.
- Must not contain flashing lights or moving parts.
- Must not resemble traffic control devices.
- Must not obstruct visibility at intersections or interfere with traffic safety.
- Must not impede City maintenance operations.

Responsibility for Election Signs

Candidates, registered third parties, and any person benefiting from the sign are responsible for ensuring that election signs comply with all municipal requirements, regardless of who installs the sign.

Non-Compliance

The City may remove election signs that do not comply with the by-law without prior notice. Removed signs may be reclaimed only after payment of any applicable fees established through the City's Fees and Charges By-law. Signs not claimed within 30 days may be disposed of by the City.

Additional Information

The City encourages all candidates, registered third parties, property owners, and residents to familiarize themselves with the Election Sign By-law to ensure a safe and respectful election period. SUBJECT: FIN-001-0021 Property Tax Billing and Collections Policy

This memo is to notify Council of the establishment of [FIN-001-0021 Property Tax Billing and Collections Policy](#). This policy was approved by the Corporate Leadership Team (CLT) on August 26, 2026. CLT also approved the repeal of policies FIN-001-0001 Tax Collection – Arrears, FIN-001-0002 Tax Installment Due Dates, and FIN-001-0003 Tax Accounts - Collection of Business Taxes because the content is now reflected in the new, more comprehensive policy.

The purpose of the policy is to:

- Ensure that property taxes are administered and collected in a timely and efficient manner and in accordance with budgetary and legislative requirements;
- Provide a consistent and transparent process when attending to all property tax accounts and owners of properties; and
- Establish parameters for the acceptable write-off of uncollectible property tax arrears.

This policy formalizes and clarifies long-standing practices already in place at the City under the prescription of the *Municipal Act, 2001* and other legislation. By documenting

these practices, property owners receive clear guidance on how the many aspects of property tax billings and collections are administered. It also gives staff and Council an important tool to use in discussions with property owners when questions or disputes arise regarding accounts.

Property tax administration is heavily governed by the various legislation noted in the new policy with very little room for staff discretion. Under the City's [Municipal Policy Governance Framework](#), this new policy did not require Council approval because it is administrative (operational) in nature. The repealed policies were also administrative policies.

Staff will communicate this new policy to taxpayers through social media and the City's website. To promote ongoing education and engagement, staff will also layer frequently asked questions about the policy into future notices, bills, and flyers sent by mail and email to property owners.

WHEREAS electric kick-style scooters (e-scooters) have become an increasingly popular and affordable form of transportation in Parry Sound and across Ontario; and

WHEREAS e-scooters can provide an accessible, low-emission transportation option and help address transportation needs in communities such as Parry Sound that do not have conventional public transit; and

WHEREAS Ontario's current e-scooter pilot program places responsibility on individual municipalities to determine how e-scooters may operate locally, creating administrative and enforcement challenges, particularly for smaller municipalities with limited resources; and

WHEREAS the continued use of a pilot framework has resulted in uncertainty and inconsistent approaches to e-scooter regulation across the Province.

Subject: Request for Review of Extended Producer Responsibility for One-Pound Single-Use Propane Cylinders

Dear Sir,

I am writing to request that the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks and the Resource Productivity & Recovery Authority (RPRA) undertake a review of the current regulatory framework governing one-pound single-use propane cylinders sold in Ontario.

Consumers purchasing these cylinders pay environmental stewardship or producer responsibility costs at the point of sale with the expectation that an appropriate end-of-life management system exists. In practice, however, accessible return and recycling opportunities for these cylinders are extremely limited across many parts of the province. Most retail locations that sell the cylinders do not accept them back, and consumers are often left with few or no practical disposal options.

As a result, municipalities have become the default managers of these products. Municipal waste facilities bear the responsibility, cost, and safety risks associated with collecting, storing, and managing these pressurized cylinders despite not being the producers or distributors of the product. Improper disposal also creates significant operational hazards at material recovery facilities, transfer stations, and landfills, including the risk of fires and equipment damage.

This situation appears inconsistent with the principles of Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR), which are intended to shift the financial and operational responsibility for post-consumer products from municipalities and taxpayers to producers. When consumers contribute to environmental handling costs at the time of purchase, there should be a convenient, accessible, and effective collection system available to ensure the product is managed responsibly at the end of its useful life.

I respectfully request that the Ministry and RPRA review the current requirements applicable to one-pound propane cylinders and consider the following:

- Assess whether the existing producer responsibility system provides sufficient and accessible return opportunities for consumers throughout Ontario.
- Evaluate whether the fees collected from consumers are being used to establish an effective province-wide collection and recycling network.

- Require producers and retailers to provide convenient and publicly accessible take-back locations wherever these products are sold.
- Review whether municipalities are being unfairly burdened with the costs and liabilities associated with managing these products.
- Consider regulatory amendments to strengthen producer accountability and ensure the objectives of Ontario's circular economy and waste diversion policies are being achieved.

Municipalities should not be left to absorb the financial costs, operational challenges, and public safety risks associated with products for which producers have collected environmental stewardship fees. A well-functioning producer responsibility system should ensure that consumers have practical disposal options and that municipalities are not forced to subsidize the end-of-life management of these products.

I appreciate your consideration of this matter and would welcome the opportunity to discuss this issue further or provide examples of the challenges municipalities continue to face regarding the management of one-pound propane cylinders.

THAT the Council of the Township of North Huron hereby directs staff to send a letter of concern regarding the regional consolidation of conservation authorities with a request to reconsider the amalgamation and keep the Lake Huron watershed Conservation Authorities separated from the Lake Simcoe area;

AND FURTHER, THAT the letter be sent to all Ontario municipalities, MPP Lisa Thompson, Premier Doug Ford, the Project Executive for the Lake Huron Regional Conservation Authority, Minister Todd McCarthy, Minister Trevor Jones, Conservation Authority Ontario, and the Ontario Federation of Agriculture.

CARRIED

The Township of North Huron is located in Huron County and is within the watershed of the Maitland River Conservation Authority (MVCA). Under the current format for Conservation Authorities, the Township, along with other municipalities who have boundaries within the MVCA watershed have representation on the MVCA Board of Directors. This process has worked well and has ensured that local knowledge of the area is kept, and issues are being handled in a timely manner. With the updated changes to the Conservation Authorities at the end of 2026, the Township of North Huron will be included under the umbrella of Huron County and will be amalgamated into the Lake Huron Regional Conservation Authority Board which will have twenty-one (21) members.

Recently, the MVCA received news that the proposed board distribution for the Lake Huron Regional Conservation Authority Board will be based on a tiered allocation formula based on population to assist in determining the amount of members that will be appointed to the board. Out of the thirteen (13) municipalities that will be included on the Board, eight (8), including Huron County will have only one member appointed, while the other municipalities will have a combined 13 members.

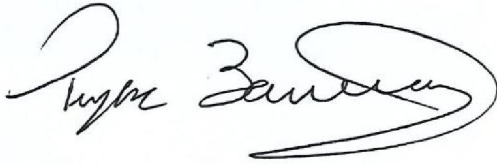

With this, the Township of North Huron is concerned that our local voice and local concerns will not be addressed, and the decisions will be left to the individuals who have higher populations and higher board representation. Due to this proposed change, local knowledge may be lost and the priorities for heavily populated areas are much different than rural areas and may not achieve the goals or priorities from rural communities. The Township of North Huron also has concerns pertaining to the financial information and effects it will have on local municipalities.

In conclusion, the Township of North Huron respectfully urges the Province of Ontario to reconsider the amalgamation of Conservation Authorities in Ontario, including the Lake Huron Regional Conservation Authority Board. The Township also encourages the Province to keep the Lake Huron watershed separate from the Lake Simcoe Watershed.
