However, any salary expenditures associated with these employees while on leave is included as an "indirect cost" and billed within the Divisional Administration rate, charged to all contracts.
3. Hard Vacancies reflect positions that do not have an employee attached and need to be filled.

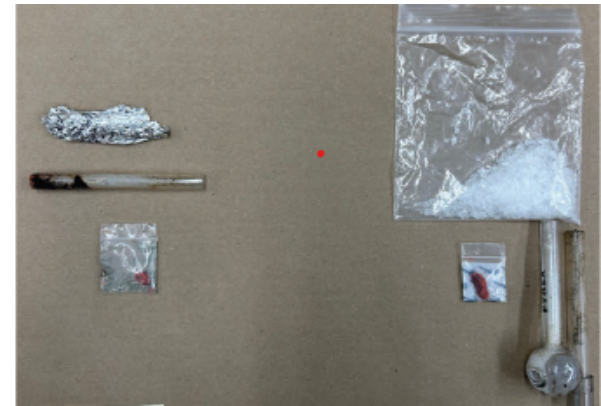

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COMMUNITY SAFETY

To enhance community safety and police visibility.

Wetaskiwin Detachment implemented directed patrols of “hotspots” which are geographical areas of higher calls for service.

Downtown foot patrols is were also implemented this quarter. Foot patrols have been well received by business and community members.



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Human Resources

City of Wetaskiwin Municipal Detachment has 27 established police officer positions; 23 officers are currently working. There are three officers that are temporarily absent (Two Graduated Return to Work and one Leave Without Pay). There is one hard vacancy currently.

Wetaskiwin Provincial Detachment has 18 established police officer positions; 14 officers are currently working. There are four officers that are temporarily absent (Three Graduated Return to Work and one Leave Without Pay). There are no hard vacancies.

Detachment Support has 12 established positions, there are 11 resources currently working. One support resource is surplus to establishment. There is one hard vacancy currently.



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Crime Trends

Overall, crime trends have increased when compared to last year (January to March). The increases of B&E are associated to RCMP working with commercial property owners to report occurrences. Theft increases associated to proactive retail crime.

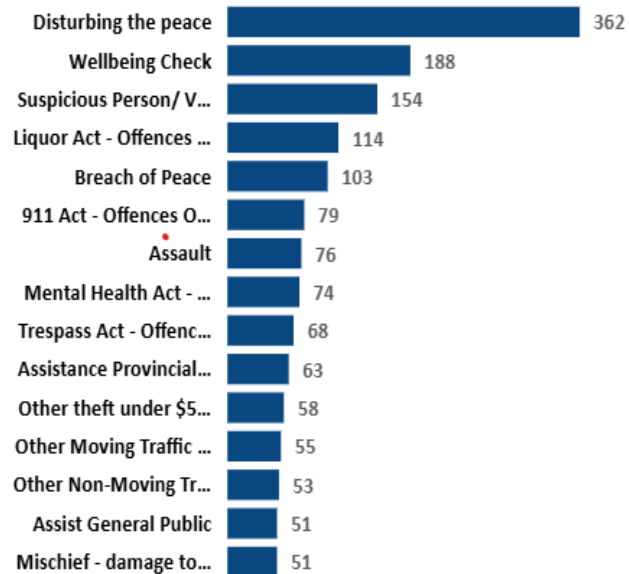

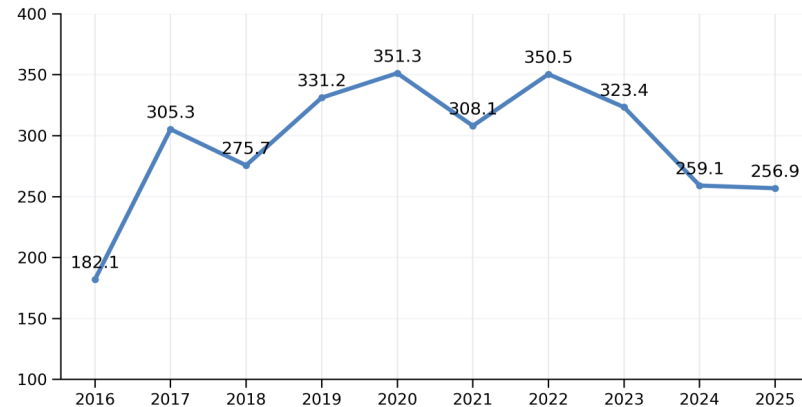
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Crime Severity Index

- Alberta average CSI is 90.6 representing a 6.6% reduction.

In 2025 Break & Enter Offences accounted for 17.4% CSI.

The largest driver to the decrease in CSI from 2024 to 2025 was a decrease in Break & Enter offences. There were 53 less in 2025 than in 2024. This caused a CSI decrease of 14.7 points.
